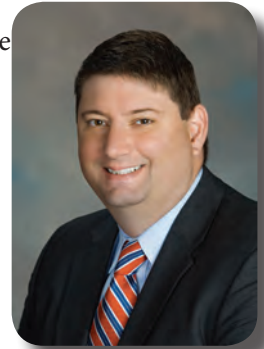
branding all of our information with the City of Manassas to distinguish our 10 square miles from the more than 90 square miles of the greater Manassas community.

The City of Manassas Rehabilitates T.N. Elliot/ Lake Manassas Dam

The City of Manassas Department of Public Works and Utilities recently completed the Lake Manassas Dam rehabilitation project. The project was originally estimated at \$11.46 million with \$4.2 million coming as a grant from the state. The Service Authority, City of Manassas and City of Manassas Park pay proportionate shares. This project was slated to take two years to complete, but was completed in 14 months at a cost savings of more than \$2 million.

"The T. Nelson Elliot Dam is instrumental to our area's water supply and management," said Director of Public Works and Utilities Mike Moon. "We appreciate the funding received and our team has worked diligently to deliver under budget."

In other Public Works news, Homeland Security visited the City of Manassas Public Works Department to learn how the City kept things up and running during the derecho when all around us the lights went out. The City was recommended as a resource by the American Public Power Association.

City of Manassas Police Awards, Promotions and Newly Sworn

During the City of Manassas Police Department's promotion and swearing-in ceremony at the Monday, Sept. 10 City Council meeting, two City of Manassas Police Officers were awarded the Medal of Valor and one officer was awarded the Honorable Service Medal.

Officer A. Plourde and Officer C.J. Golick were awarded the Medal of Valor for noticing a fire in a residence, rescuing four residents and notifying Fire & Rescue personnel to the possibility of another resident in the house. This led to all residents being rescued successfully.

Officer D.T. Villanueva was awarded the Honorable Service Medal for saving the life of a 15-year-old boy. After being flagged down by a person in the street

and discovering an unconscious boy who was not breathing, Officer Villanueva began CPR and was able to ascertain valuable health information which is credited with saving this young man's life.

Along with these awards, the City of Manassas Police Department promoted the following officers: Sgt. S.A. Morbeto was promoted to Lieutenant, and Sr. Police Officer V.P. Hatcher, Master Police Officer G.P. Hawkins and Master Police Officer L.S.W. Nevill were all promoted to Sergeant.

Lt. Morbeto will be serving in Planning and Resource Management. Sgt. Hatcher will be serving in the Traffic Services Unit. Sgt. Hawkins will be serving on the night shift and is excited about

mentoring new members of the force. Sgt. Nevill will be serving as Community Services Supervisor.

During the City of Manassas Fire & Rescue Department's promotion and swearing-in ceremony at the Monday, Sept. 17 City Council meeting, four Fire & Rescue members were promoted to Master Technicians and two new employees were sworn in to the department.

Fire & Rescue members Steve Schmid, Ray Daubenberger, Matt Fox and Karl Sampson were promoted to Master Technicians. They will become mentors to the younger firefighters in the department and serve as second in command for their shifts, assisting the Lieutenant in managing programs and activities.

Firefighter/Medic Jessica Merrill and Firefighter/EMT Adam Potter were hired on July 16 and completed a five-week orientation and training program in August. Both new hires have been placed into active service on the fire apparatus and medic units. During their one-year probationary period, these new Fire & Rescue personnel will undergo further mentoring and evaluation.

"With these promotions and our two new members, the City of Manassas Fire & Rescue Department is now fully staffed," said Chief Brett Bowman.

- The General Election is Tuesday, Nov. 6. Polls are open from 6 a.m. to 7 p.m.

City of Manassas Teacher Receives Horace Mann Award



Kellie Blair Hardt, special education teacher at Metz Middle School, was the recipient of the National Education Association's Horace Mann Award for

Teaching Excellence. The award, along with a check for \$10,000, is given to five teachers from across the country each year. In the near future, one of the five teachers will receive the NEA Member Benefits Award for Teaching Excellence and \$25,000.

Kellie Blair Hardt has an incredible story along her teaching journey. In ninth grade, she was expelled and ordered to attend a Job Corps program. During the program, she completed her GED and went to work at K-mart in Manassas. A co-worker noticed her interest in art and took her to Northern Virginia Community College to enroll. At a meeting of the Virginia Education Association

that Kellie went to for the free pizza, she got the feeling that this is what she wanted to do with her life.

"I was so afraid of school because I'd had such a hard time with it," Hardt said. "I failed at school, so it wasn't for me. I found a connection and I started preaching on the value of education. . . I thought, *This is what I want to do.*"

Since that time, Kellie Blair Hardt has been in college. First, she attended Virginia Tech where she received her bachelor's degree. Then, she earned her master's degree at George Mason University (GMU). Today, she is enrolled in GMU's doctoral program for community college education.

While teaching at Metz Middle School and attending GMU, Kellie finds the time to serve as one of Virginia's representatives on the board of the NEA. This is an amazing feat from a woman who was abandoned by her mother when she was two years old and had been homeless in middle school, sleeping on a park bench not far from her school.

Congratulations on a well deserved award to an incredible teacher!
