

For the Love of Trains

The Winter Wonderland Train Show is on track to begin Dec. 10 and run through Dec. 14 at the Center for the Arts at the Candy Factory (9419 Battle Street). Admission to the show is a donation of food or money to benefit SERVE, the Candy Factory's sponsored local charity.

This year, the show features both the latest trains from today's major manufacturers, a 28 x 8 foot Standard Gauge layout and trains from the early 20th Century. Show hours are Wednesday through Friday from 5 to 8 p.m., Saturday from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., and Sunday from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Santa usually makes an appearance on Saturday and Sunday afternoons.

The Winter Wonderland Train Show is presented by the National Capital Trackers and the Center for the Arts. The National Capital Trackers are an award winning "O" Gauge modular railroad club that supports 24-26 shows annually in the Washington, D.C. area.





Watch Council Meetings in a New Way

The City of Manassas has unveiled COMTV, a new service through the City's website where viewers may either watch streaming video of live City Council Meetings or watch previous meetings on-demand. Viewers who wish to stream live City Council meetings may visit www.manassascity.org/mediacenter.

Those who wish to watch a certain item in a City Council Meeting may visit www.manassascity.org/comtv, click on the meeting to be viewed then click on the item the viewer is interested in. By clicking on the agenda item, the film will advance directly to that portion of the meeting.

In this way, you can skip to exactly the part of the meeting you want to see when you want to see it. This new service is part of our continuing effort to keep residents and visitors to the City of Manassas more informed and involved with their local government.

A Message from the City Manager

Over the past several months I have continued to be amazed at the number and variety of events that are happening in the Greater Manassas area and in particular in our Historic Downtown. I know that many of you are also interested in these events as we often hear comments about the event listings in this newsletter. One of the concerns that we often hear, depending on where you are in the utility bill cycle, is that you might see an event that you would have liked to attend but it happened the weekend just before you received the newsletter. Let me try to explain why this occurs.

Since utility bills are sent on a staggered schedule throughout the month (as an industry best practice for efficiency in billing) we list two months of events to allow everyone to see what is upcoming for several weeks after you receive the newsletter. This also means that most of the time you will also see some events that occurred the past couple of weeks. Since it is cost prohibitive to send out an updated newsletter with every utility bill we also have other methods that you can use to stay abreast of events. You can go to our website www.manassascity.org to read the newsletters as soon as they are published. One other initiative that I would like to share is a citizen satisfaction survey that will solicit thoughts and opinions about city government programs and services. Since this survey is only sent to a random sample of households spread throughout the City, if you receive the survey, your input is important. The time you invest in this survey will influence decisions made to improve existing services and determine future needs for the City of Manassas.

What's Under Your Feet?

Visit the new exhibit at the Manassas Museum. What's Under Your Feet is an exhibit on archaeology and how the items found can form the stories of our past. Archaeological studies at Mayfield Earthwork Fort found not only artifacts from the Civil War period--which was quite expected since it was a Civil War fort--but also uncovered objects that tell the story of Native American occupation of the site. Additional artifacts recovered from Liberia Plantation, the Manassas Industrial School and the old slave quarter building at Clover Hill Farm will also be displayed in the exhibit.

One particularly interesting group of artifacts came from the Weir family cemetery when it was moved from an area being developed to a spot on the grounds of Liberia, the Weir family home. Experts from the Smithsonian Institution assisted in uncovering and moving the remains and found a family member that had been well preserved for more than 100 years thanks to his cast iron coffin with a glass viewing window.

What's Under Your Feet has been partially underwritten by a generous donation from local resident William Olsen. The exhibit is open through February 15, Tuesdays through Sundays from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Businesses in Old Town will be selling candy bars. Five will have golden tickets that will get the lucky winners a ride on Santa's float in the Christmas Parade.



Fire Safety for Winter Heating

Can you feel the chill in the air? It is almost here. Winter is right around the corner. The City of Manassas Fire & Rescue Department would like to offer the following safety tips to keep you safe and warm this winter.

Portable Electric Heaters


Remember to keep furniture and other combustible items at least three feet away from heaters. Electric heaters are temporary heating devices that should only be used for a limited time each day. Never connect an electric heater to an outlet with an extension

combustibles.

Use coal only if specifically approved by the stove manufacturer. Gasoline or other flammable liquids



Barbeques (Yes, there are cases of people using barbeques in their homes)
Barbecues should never be used indoors or as a heating or cooking device. Barbeques produce large amounts of carbon

monoxide that is unhealthy to breathe.



Fireplaces

Before using the fireplace make sure the flue is open. The flue is a trap door that keeps heat out in the summer and cool air from coming in when the fireplace is not in use. Artificial logs made from wax and sawdust should be used one at a time. Pressure-treated wood should not be burned in stoves or fireplaces because it contains toxic chemicals that can

make you sick. Never leave a fireplace unattended. Chimneys and vents should be inspected and cleaned annually. Have chimneys inspected and cleaned when necessary by a professional chimney sweep.



Kerosene Heaters

Only use clean kerosene fuel. Never fill with gasoline, diesel fuel, or any other flammable liquid. Always take the heater outdoors to a safe location to re-fill. Make sure that the unit is off when re-filling. Kerosene Heaters produce carbon

monoxide (CO) gas. Be sure to have a working CO detector in your home as well as a smoke alarm.

Leaf Collection

The City's curbside leaf collection program for 2014/2015 has started. Holiday Schedule for Recycling and Trash Collection

Did you know that between Thanksgiving and New Year's Day, Americans generate one million tons of extra trash every week? During the Holiday Season, take note of the following changes:

- Thanksgiving Day (Nov. 27, 2014)

 no trash service. Trash collection normally scheduled for that day will be collected on Saturday, Nov. 29, 2014.
- Christmas Day (Dec. 25, 2014) no trash service. Trash normally scheduled for collection will be collected on Saturday, Dec. 27, 2014.
- New Year's Day (Jan. 1, 2015) no trash service. Trash normally scheduled for collection will be collected on Saturday, Jan. 3, 2015.
- There will be regular service Christmas Eve (Dec. 24, 2014) and New Year's Eve (Dec. 31, 2014).

All other yard waste, recycling and trash collection service for these weeks will follow a normal schedule.
