The Professionals

For third and fourth grade students in Kimberly Hayden's class at Weems Elementary, it's not just another day of the week, it's Wednesday! An exciting day in their school because it is TAG day. Weems Elementary is a Talents and Gifts (TAG) themed school. Twice a year all Weems students get to choose a multigrade, interest-based, project driven TAG enrichment cluster.

Over the past year and a half, three groups of third and fourth grade students have chosen the "Playground Planners" enrichment cluster. These students have been working with the City's Community Development team to design their new playground. On their first day of TAG, the students put on their name badges, and became professionals. They worked together as a team to create the best playground plan for their school.

This has been an engaging, handson process with over three semesters of students participating as Playground Planners. The first group began last spring, when students heard from City planners about the process of designing a community park. They learned how to listen to their stakeholders and how to use that information in their designs.

From there, Christen Zenich, the City of Manassas Operations and Facilities Supervisor, Culture and Recreation Division, took over. She worked with students on creating a vision, introduced them to playground sales representatives and to the challenges of staying on a budget. "Working with these students has been a labor of love," said Zenich. "They have the most creative ideas and they really have worked as professionals."

The next group of young professionals began in the fall. The students welcomed sales representatives from three different playground

companies. They explained to the representatives the constraints of their projects, their visions and needs, and together they each came up with a plan for the new playground. With Ms. Zenich and Ms. Hayden's help, students evaluated the proposals sent by their playground representatives. After much discussion and compromise, students refined each playground vision to keep it within budget and designed it to meet their specifications.

"I am so thankful for the opportunity to work with the kids at Weems
Elementary on their new playground," said Brad Stokely with Playground
Specialists, Inc. "It was impressive to see how organized the Playground team I worked with was in developing their wish list of items they wanted to see on their new playground."

In January, the school TAG Share Fair was the students' opportunity to showcase their final designs and receive additional feedback from their stakeholders, the student body. The room lit up that day with excitement as each student had the opportunity to vote for their favorite playground.

"The skills and lessons these kids are walking away with are so valuable and something they can use all their lives," says Ms. Hayden. "They are learning to collaborate and make choices that impact more than themselves. But more importantly, they are learning

that they can make a difference in their community."

The current Playground Planners Cluster is comprised of thirteen students who asked to remain on the project and nine new students for this semester.

"I joined this group because I wanted a chance to make a difference at my school," remarked Weems third grade student Max Davila.

Currently, the group is at work advertising the new playground to the community, creating a timeline for installation, and keeping the student body informed, as well as planning a ribbon cutting for the community. Flyers were created by students and posted around the school to build excitement for the new playground unveiling. On April 26 at 3 p.m., Playground Cluster members will cut a ribbon on "Champs' Clubhouse," the playground they designed from the ground up.



A Message from the City Manager

Throughout March and April, City Council spends many hours in meetings reviewing and examining a budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1. This process requires that a balanced budget be presented by the City Manager; a maximum tax rate be advertised 30 days before a public hearing; and after review and public input, a budget is adopted and a tax rate is set by Council.

The proposed budget that Council is working on is built to maintain the high quality services and programs that you currently receive from the City. It is developed based on the City strategic plan and priorities, and adheres to the sound financial practices and policies that have been adopted by City Council. It is designed to provide a safe and growing community where services and programs

are delivered in an effective and efficient manner.

Priorities for operational areas addressed in the proposed budget include: a 2.625% increase in local funding for the Manassas City Public Schools; funds to replace declining motor fuels taxes to support PRTC and VRE operations; and funding to remain competitive in recruitment and retention of city staff, including fire and rescue positions and police officers. We are also focusing on capital purchases like Fire and Rescue equipment, Parks, Culture and Recreation improvements, additional funds for street maintenance, transportation projects, and utility capital enhancements.

Our increases this year are focused on utility operations, which are supported by the utility rates, and other capital projects, many of which are supported with capital reserves. Taking out these increases to get a better apples-to-apples comparison, the total operating budget would be increasing by less than 1%. This is due to the efforts of departments to find efficiencies in operation and to limit any increases in service costs.

The proposed tax rate to fund ongoing operations would result in about a \$4 monthly increase for the typical residential home owner or a 1.25% increase over the current tax rate. The \$1.59 million in new property tax

revenues in this proposal would support \$1.422 million for our schools and a portion of the additional funding needed for corresponding utility revenues. The Capital Improvement Program includes bond funds for a new Public Safety Facility, Dean Park improvements, partial funding for a Downtown Library/ Museum facility, and road improvements along South Grant Ave. and West Street. Increasing the tax rate by 3.4% in total would provide funding for these projects, resulting in a total increase for the average homeowner of an additional \$7 per month.

April 18, 2017: Absentee Ballot Return Deadline, 7:00 p.m.

A Few Notes About Water

Hydrant Flushing

The City of Manassas will be cleaning water mains beginning on April 10, 2017 and will take four to six weeks to complete. Our crews will be flushing fire hydrants weekdays from 7:30 a.m. - 3:00 p.m. This program helps to clean sediment from our mains and serves as an opportunity to inspect and maintain all of our fire hydrants.

Switch: Chloramines to Free Chlorine

Each year, the City of Manassas switches from chloramines to free chlorine for about six weeks. Free chlorine is a more aggressive disinfectant, and this temporary change in the water treatment process prevents bacteria from developing resistances to the usual disinfection treatment process. Some customers may notice a slight chemical smell in their drinking water. This may be similar to that of water in a swimming pool. Each individual has his or her own sensitivity level to the taste and/or odor of free chlorine. Many detect no difference.

Occasionally during the cleaning of water mains and hydrants in your area, some discoloration of water may be noticed. This condition is not harmful and should clear up quickly by running your cold water for a short period of time. It is recommended that you limit your clothes washing during the flushing

hours. We appreciate your cooperation as we work to maintain water quality while minimizing any inconveniences.
